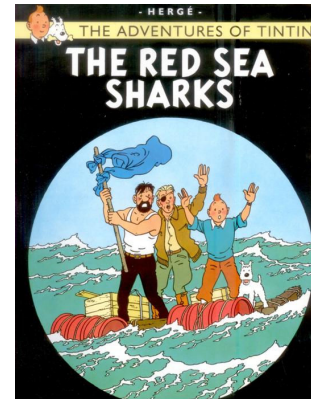

## Tintin: The Red Sea Sharks



- ☑ “The chap who played the lead was a good actor,” said Captain Haddock while lighting his pipe.
  - **chap** /tʃæp/ noun [C] (ALSO **chappie**, ALSO **chappy**) UK INFORMAL OLD-FASHIONED  
a man:  
*He's a friendly sort of a chap.*
  - **the lead** noun [C]  
the main actor in a film or play
  
- ☑ Tintin: He looked a lot like our old friend General Alkazar.  
Captain Haddock: The ending was far too improbable! I can't believe that things like that really happen: You think about someone and he pops up on the street corner just like that.
  - **pop up** phrasal verb INFORMAL  
to appear or happen, especially suddenly or unexpectedly:  
*She's one of those film stars who pops up everywhere, on TV, in magazines, on Broadway.*  
*The words 'Hard disk failure - program aborted' popped up on the screen.*
  
- ☑ While they were talking they bumped into General Alkazar! Captain Haddock who had not recognized the general started yelling and cursing. “You misguided missile! Can't you watch where you are going?”
  - **bump** /bʌmp/ verb
    - 1 [I + adverb or preposition] to hit something with force:  
*She bumped into his tray, knocking the food onto his lap.*
    - 2 [T usually + adverb or preposition] to hurt part of your body by hitting it against something hard:  
*I bumped my head on the shelf as I stood up.*

**bump into sb** phrasal verb  
to meet someone you know when you have not planned to meet them:  
*We bumped into Kate when we were in London last week.*
  - **curse** /kɜːs/ verb [I or T]  
to say a word or an expression which is not polite and shows that you are very angry:  
*We could hear him cursing and swearing as he tried to get the door open.*  
*I could curse her for losing my key!*

- ☑ The general is taken aback and took his leave saying that he was late for an appointment.

- **take sb aback** phrasal verb  
to surprise or shock someone so much that they do not know how to behave for a short time:  
*I was a little taken aback at the directness of the question.*  
*The news really took us aback.*

☑ Tintin: “What’s this? It’s the general’s wallet. He must have dropped it when you bumped into him.” They dashed across the street to catch the general.

- **dash** /dæʃ/ verb [I]  
to go somewhere quickly:  
*I’ve been dashing around all day.*  
*I must dash - I’ve got to be home by seven.*

☑ They went to the hotel where the general had said he was staying. They described the general to the receptionist (a fairly heavy-built man with a small moustache) but he had never seen any such person.
